Thought for the Week – from Caroline

Matthew 5:22 "Whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, 'You fool!' will be liable to the hell of fire."

Psalm 14:1 "The fool says in his heart, 'There is no God.' They are corrupt, their deeds are vile; there is no one who does good."

It was not sinful for the Psalmist to say that people who say, "There is no God," are fools, because that is simply objective truth, and it was not sinful for Jesus to call the Pharisees "blind fools" because that was also simply objective truth. Matthew 5:22 is in the context of anger and hatred, which Jesus said is equivalent to murder; it's when we maliciously slander someone, most likely to their face, that it's wrong. Whereas I believe Psalm 14:1 is based more on foolish behaviour, ignorance and decisions. We are going through the Just10 series with J. John. I just love his honesty, and particularly last week when he shared the story of his standing next to a man in front of the urinals in the Gents. J. John said to God, "The man's an idiot," because the man was on his phone when it was inappropriate. It's wonderful that J. John doesn't portray himself as super-holy, in fact he's just like us, I thought. I wouldn't call a person a fool to their face, I might say "your behaviour is foolish," but I have said "idiot" in the car or in my head, and I wonder how many people have called politicians fools (maybe that's objective truth too, if I could, I would put a laughing emoji by that comment). I'm not saying it's OK, but I don't think for one moment God is fazed by our humanness, He knows us far too well, after all, didn't the disciples want to call fire down on people who didn't welcome Jesus, because he was heading for Jerusalem? Luke 9:54-55 "When the disciples James and John saw this, they asked, 'Lord, do you want us to call fire down from heaven to destroy them?' But Jesus turned and rebuked them." Fools are mentioned quite a lot in the Bible. But we can and should, however, do all we can to turn the hearts of those exhibiting foolishness toward wisdom and possibly save their lives and their eternal souls (James 5:20).
